At the fall meeting of the Metropolitan Council, it was suggested that the financial activity of the central church administration of The Orthodox Church in America be in compliance with the standards as found in the "Best Practices Principles for Non-Profit Financial Accountability."

Metropolitan Herman accepted the suggestion and announced that beginning with year 2006, the Best Practices Principles for Non-Profit Financial Accountability would become a standard used in the work of the central church administration. He appointed Acting Treasurer, Father Paul Kucynda to oversee this effort.

Protodeacon Peter Danilchick, who is well versed in the Best Practice Principles and has authored a draft specific to the needs of the central church administration, is being assisted by Matushka Mary Buletza Breton and Mr. Robert Kornafel. The goal of the project is to establish a document that deals with the financial governance, structures, controls, and reporting in compliance with the "Best Practices Principles for Non-Profit Financial Accountability."
